Shea took home a medal for winning the Marksman Category in Prone. Mr P and grandson Blake won the Gold for the anysight Team matches and Bronze medal for combined Team results at the ASSA National Matches at the Cardinal Center this summer.

Our current roster has 13 active returning athletes in our rifle program and we have signed up an additional 10 new members so far as the 2018-2019 season gets underway. We will be moving indoors at Peterborough Sportsmen's Club the first week in November. We will be holding a State Indoor Prone Match in December and then the CMP 3-Position Air Rifle State Championships in January. Our Travel Team athletes will be busy in January & February

competing in NRA Sectional Matches and Junior Olympic Tryouts around New England.

We received a new air rifle for 2017 and two new rifles for 2018 plus a bunch of equipment thanks to the NRA Foundation. We will be looking to add a couple of air rifles in 2019. 

The best way to train a shotgun is lots of practice. And then more practice.





Action Pistol

Nervous and seated at a table, my unloaded firearm was in a box and a loaded magazine on the table next to the box. At the signal to start, I opened the box, grabbed the gun and reached for the magazine. I was all thumbs! I tried to insert it BACKWARDS. I took a breath, successfully loaded it and proceeded to dump a whole magazine trying to hit the dropleg target that started the whole action scenario. My hands were shaking. Then it occurred to me if this were a real-life situation, I'd be in trouble. It's better to make the mistakes here. I did manage to finish the stage. The jitters subsided, and I walked back to the group prepared to take some well-earned kidding. But that did not happen. I was met with suggestions on how to improve. Some related their first time and what they did to focus. No one laughed. Some offered me ammo because they thought I may need it - yeah, that bordered on snark, but we all laughed! The second stage went a little smoother, realizing that focus

was important. Slowing down, seeing the 'sight' and slowly squeezing the trigger helped a lot. Each stage got a little easier to run. That was my first ACTION PISTOL experience some 5 years ago and it would have been my last if it were not for the support of those there. The competitors, the RSO, the volunteers that make this all happen all know we have to start somewhere and are all there to support you.

I learned the things I needed to practice. Reloads, one-hand shooting, effective use of cover. Being aware of your surroundings, awareness of non-threats and priority of threats all became second nature with time. All things anyone serious about CCW must be aware of. Yes, it is all about practice. I fiercely defended last place for a few months by watching others, seeing where my gun handling skills were weak and working on them slowly moved me up in the standings. I learned a lot over the years. My skills and confidence have improved but I am still learning. You will never stop learning. I also realized how hard



it is to run a program like this. Life is different on the other side of the shot timer. Creating stages to challenge the seasoned shooter while not intimidating the newbie is hard. Maintaining an atmosphere of friendly competition however, is easy due to the nature and mindset of those involved. It is also a lot of physical work. It could not run without volunteers. I am so grateful to have the 'usual suspects' there to help. Setting up for a match takes perhaps 6+ hours for 6 stages. More if the weather does not cooperate. I will NEVER turn down help! (read: 'I can use more help')! I would like to have more stages next year. AP has purchased additional action targets and built some more props. Ideas as well as more peoplepower (ouch, that was PC) are welcome.

Our goal in AP is to help you become safe and proficient with what you carry as well as prepare you to feel confident when competing in IDPA matches at other clubs. Please, don't feel intimidated. Stop by and watch a match. Stages are usually designed around some contrived scenario, usually not politically correct, usually reflecting the views of the author. (Sorry Dick's Sporting goods).

We have practice every Wednesday night, 4:00 until dark, while the weather holds.
We resume in the spring right after the mud firms up.


